His recent books are *The Failed Promise: Reconstruction, Frederick Douglass, and the Impeachment of Andrew Johnson* (W. W. Norton, 2021), *Race, Transnationalism, and Nineteenth-Century American Literary Studies* (Cambridge University Press, 2018), and *The Lives of Frederick Douglass* (Harvard University Press, 2016). Levine is the general editor of *The Norton Anthology of American Literature* and the editor and coeditor of a number of volumes. He has been awarded fellowships from the National Endowment for the Humanities and the Guggenheim Foundation.
